Cloud-Powered Teams

[Cloud-based document management](#) systems empower team members to easily and securely access shared documents from any location. In addition, with Office 365, co-authors can collaborate in real-time on a shared document.

For instance, envision a sales team preparing a PowerPoint presentation for an important user conference. In the old days, team members might edit individual copies of the presentation or take turns editing a central document.

Now, co-authors can edit a shared document simultaneously, regardless of the distance between them. Each author can see the other's changes as they make them. With version control and [real-time collaboration](#), Office 365 saves time and headaches.

Efficient Virtual Meetings Connect Remote Workers

Cutting edge technology alone will not create an effective meeting. Follow a few common-sense tips to make your virtual meetings as efficient as possible.

- **Agendas never go out of style** – Whether team members gather from across the hall or across the world, take the time to get everyone on the same page. Include the meeting topics in the calendar invite or email an agenda 24 to 48 hours ahead.
- **Come prepared** – Before the meeting, compile any notes or background information you need to reference, as well as a list of talking points or questions.
- **Troubleshoot your tech** – Confirm how to dial in and that your speakers work. If you need internet to access your conference or your email or notes, test your connection ahead of time.
- **Sharing is caring** – If you are reviewing any information with accompanying visuals or statistics or if the meeting will reference external documents, make sure all participants can follow along. Set up a screen share so that you can keep everyone on the same page.
- **Be direct** – To avoid indistinct vocal jumbles or empty air time, frame questions specifically to other meeting participants.
- **Personality perks** – Adjust for the difference in visual cues in the virtual environment. Be as personable as you would be in person—or more so, as the meeting requires. High energy will engage your audience and keep them tuned in to the topics at hand.



Culture Enhances Collaboration

Culture building takes on an increasingly critical role as teams become more separated by distance and local customs. The time you invest in creating a unified culture will pay off in terms of increased collaboration.

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Tried and true methods like monthly newsletters, perhaps with features and updates by remote workers, continue to connect team members. Add a social media presence to engage workers on multiple channels.

Be creative in employing technology to build culture. Implement a virtual happy hour or weekly trivia game in a group chat. Meet via video frequently. Consider deploying virtual reality headsets for in person collaboration.
